ABOUT THE FACULTY OF HEALTH SCIENCES

The Faculty of Health Sciences comprises three schools:

- Allied Health
- Behavioural and Health Sciences
- Nursing, Midwifery and Paramedicine

There are currently approximately 14,000 students (EFTSL) and 530 (FTE) staff in the faculty under the disciplines: occupational therapy, speech pathology, social work, exercise science, exercise physiology, nutrition science, biomedical science, nursing, midwifery, paramedicine, physiotherapy, psychology and public health. The Faculty is represented across seven ACU campuses.

The Faculty's current research priorities focus on Cardiovascular Disease and Metabolism, Health Services Research, Nutrition, Sports Performance and Rehabilitation, Psychology and Mental Health.

An expanding portfolio of postgraduate courses is also available in coursework and research. Many postgraduate courses within the Faculty have been developed in conjunction with industries in order to meet specific needs of the professions and industry. Some postgraduate units are offered in flexible learning mode by online study. All students have professional and clinical experience that is supervised by specially qualified practitioners. Catholic hospitals and other public, private and specialty organisations, as well as schools and the health and sports industry, are involved with preparing for promoting and offering this valued and essential experience.

The Discipline Physiotherapy at ACU was established in 2010 and is located across three campuses - Ballarat, Brisbane and North Sydney. All Campuses host cutting edge facilities complete with anatomy wet laboratories and physiotherapy-specific teaching rooms. Students are taught all facets of the practice of physiotherapy and provided with wide-ranging opportunities and support to practice their emerging skills.

Physiotherapy teaching staff include lecturers, researchers and clinicians, who contribute to the learning and teaching program and conduct research in a broad range of Physiotherapy related areas. The comprehensive program at ACU provides the skills for graduates to work across a variety of clinical areas and professional practice settings.

POSITION PURPOSE

This Senior Lecturer in Physiotherapy (Level C) appointment is expected to make significant contributions to the development and implementation of the Bachelor of Physiotherapy at Australian Catholic University by providing technical, clinical and industry advice and contribute to research relevant to the field of physiotherapy. The Senior Lecturer in Physiotherapy will work with the Head of Discipline Physiotherapy, the Victorian, New South Wales, and Queensland Physiotherapy Course Coordinators and other physiotherapy staff to ensure that the implementation of the National program of Physiotherapy is comprehensively managed. The Senior Lecturer in Physiotherapy will develop a research profile relevant to physiotherapy and supervise honours students. The incumbent of this role will be situated at the North Sydney campus.

SELECTION CRITERIA

Qualifications, skills, knowledge and experience:	 Qualification - A higher degree (Doctor of Philosophy/ Clinical Doctorate or equivalent) in Physiotherapy and current physiotherapy registration with the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency (AHPRA). Experience - An established research profile with a demonstrated understanding of the nexus between teaching and research in approaches to teaching and learning. Experience - Evidence of research leadership including Honours and HDR students. Experience - Established coherent program of quality research including a sustained record of high-quality outputs of research aligned to the national and/or ACU research priorities. Experience - Evidence of substantial tertiary teaching experience in physiotherapy - the position is not linked to a particular role or skill set, so applicants from all fields of physiotherapy practice are encouraged to apply. Experience - Demonstrated experience in curriculum development, curriculum implementation and course or subject co- ordination at a level appropriate to the level of appointment. Skill - Demonstrated high level interpersonal communication skills and ability to work collaboratively and cooperatively in teams across a national organisation to deliver shared goals. Skill - Demonstrated ability to develop and maintain collegial relationships with relevant stakeholders to achieve effective outcomes for the organisation.
