ABOUT THE FACULTY OF THEOLOGY & PHILOSOPHY

The Faculty of Theology and Philosophy is the largest Faculty of its kind in Australia, comprised of two national schools, the School of Theology and the School of Philosophy, the Institute for Religion and Critical Inquiry, and several smaller specialist Centres.

ACU has prioritised research excellence in a number of areas of strategic priority, including theology and philosophy. In the 2023 QS ranking in Theology, Divinity and Religious studies, for example, ACU was ranked first in Australia, and top 25 in the world. Our Philosophy program also continues to rank highly in Australian assessments: for example, at 'above world standard' in the most recent Excellence in Research for Australia rankings. A particular strength of the Faculty's research profile is its growing network of collaborations with international partners that leads to joint publication projects, research conferences and workshops (in Australia, at our Rome campus, and beyond), co-supervision of research students, and joint programs for research funding.

We offer high quality theology and philosophy programs of study for students at any stage of their life or career journey, with learning opportunities provided across multiple points of engagement, and across a variety of delivery modes. This includes Mission-aligned short courses, certificate and bachelor-level courses, postgraduate coursework programs, Higher-degree by research programs, international study tours, and a wide range of professional learning and in-service opportunities. Our programs are designed in collaboration with industry, community, and church to equip students with the knowledge and skills required to succeed in an evolving, global and digital world.

ABOUT THE INSTITUTE FOR RELIGION AND CRITICAL INQUIRY

The Institute for Religion and Critical Inquiry (IRCI) collaborates with researchers from around the globe to examine ideas, beliefs, practises and history in order to advance understanding of our world and imagine ways to improve it. To this end the IRCI promotes collaborative research on religion and critical thought, exploring the inter-relationships between religion and its cultural contexts, and how it contributes to contemporary theological, historical, philosophical, social, and political debates.

Founded in 2014, the Institute's research programs in Biblical and Early Christian Studies and Religion and Theology includes full-time researchers, affiliate and honorary staff, and research students. The IRCI has established research partnerships with leading institutions in Europe, the UK, and North America, and presents a series of research seminars each year at ACU's Rome Campus. Research activities encompass projects, seminars, workshops, public engagement and conferences that enhance intellectual discourse and debate. Its staff also teach into ACU's coursework programs in theology and ancient languages and history.



As part of the Faculty for Theology and Philosophy, IRCI contributes to the largest such Faculty in Australia, one that offers undergraduate and postgraduate courses and higher research degrees across eight campuses. The Institute has contributed strongly to ACU's ranking of 1st in Australia and 22nd in the world in theology, divinity, and religious studies (QS 2025) and ACU's Leiden CWTS 2024 score of 1st in Australia for research quality in Humanities and Social Sciences (proportion of papers in the top 10% frequently cited).

POSITION PURPOSE

The Research Fellow / Senior Research Fellow will conduct high-quality research as a member of the Religion and Theology Program. Their area of speciality, will lie within contemporary theologies, with a focus in historical and systematic theologies, and Catholic theologies broadly and ecumenically conceived. The Religion and Theology program is home to scholars of historical and systematic theology, philosophical theology, Christian spiritualities, and Catholic thought and practice. Much of our work is interdisciplinary and seeks to connect historical theological traditions and texts with contemporary realities and challenges. Examples of our current international research projects include 'Theologies of Catholicity' and 'Art Engaged Theology'. Recently concluded research projects include 'Spiritual Understanding in a Secular Age: Engaging Art as Religious Ritual' and 'Redeeming Autonomy: Agency, Vulnerability, and Relationality'.

The Research Fellow / Senior Fellow will contribute to the research and teaching profile of the Institute, Faculty, and University. We seek applicants with demonstrable research expertise in historical and systematic theology broadly conceived, as well as clear ability to put historical theological sources in dialogue with contemporary issues. We also seek candidates with excellent communication skills and demonstrable teaching expertise in these areas, committed to forming inquiring minds at undergraduate level and working with more advanced students at graduate and higher degree level.

Applicants will work collegially and collaboratively to build their own research and teaching profiles and contribute to team projects within their areas of specialisation and across traditional disciplinary boundaries as appropriate. They will be expected to contribute to the Program's collaborative activities, including seminars, reading groups, and workshops. They will also be expected to contribute to the collegial and scholarly life of the wider Institute and Faculty. The Institute includes scholars of Christian Theology, Early Christianity, Scripture and Religious Studies, and we expect that applicants will be motivated to join a community of scholars interested in fostering and sustaining conversations between these different disciplines and others across ACU's broad humanities programs.

SELECTION CRITERIA

Qualifications, skills, knowledge and experience:	 Qualification - A PhD in Christian Theology (Historical/Systematic/Contemporary). Experience – A track record of scholarly publications of an excellent international standard, appropriate to the level of appointment. Experience - High quality teaching experience in undergraduate and/or postgraduate units and courses, appropriate to the level of appointment. Experience – Ability to work effectively both individually and collegially as part of a collaborative research team. Experience - Success in external research funding applications is desirable, depending on level of appointment. Skill – Awareness of ACU's Mission, Vision and Values, including the capacity to demonstrate an understanding of how this role serves ACU's Mission. Skill – Proven commitment to equity, diversity, and inclusivity principles, including the understanding of cultural diversity and ethical practice, equal employment opportunity and workplace health and safety.
