ABOUT THE FACULTY OF HEALTH SCIENCES

The Faculty of Health Sciences comprises three schools:

- Allied Health
- Behavioural and Health Sciences
- Nursing, Midwifery and Paramedicine

There are currently approximately 14,000 students (EFTSL) and 520 (FTE) staff in the faculty under the disciplines: occupational therapy, speech pathology, social work, exercise science, exercise physiology, nutrition science, biomedical science, nursing, midwifery, paramedicine, physiotherapy, psychology and public health. The Faculty is represented across seven ACU campuses.

The Faculty's current research priorities focus on Cardiovascular Disease and Metabolism, Health Services Research, Nutrition, Sports Performance and Rehabilitation, Psychology and Mental Health.

An expanding portfolio of postgraduate courses is also available in coursework and research. POSITION PURPOSE

The Lecturer in Speech Pathology will contribute to the development and implementation of the national Bachelor of Speech Pathology program at ACU by providing theoretical and clinical expertise to teaching and scholarship of learning and teaching. The lecturer will teach into and coordinate units of study within the Speech Pathology program that align with their experience and expertise.

The Lecturer in Speech Pathology will also demonstrate high-quality research activities aligned to the national and/or ACU research priorities and supervise honours and higher degree by research students. The Lecturer in Speech Pathology will work closely with ACU Speech Pathology staff on their campus and across the national program to optimise student learning experiences and outcomes.

SELECTION CRITERIA

Qualifications, skills, knowledge and experience:	 Qualification - A doctorate or substantial progress towards a doctorate in Speech Pathology. Qualification - A degree in speech pathology (Bachelor or Master level) and eligibility for membership of Speech Pathology Australia. Knowledge - Advanced knowledge or practice demonstrated in significant clinical experience and/or teaching experience (including clinical education). Skill - Demonstrated capacity to implement effective teaching and
	 learning at the higher education level. Knowledge - Demonstrated understanding of the nexus between teaching and research in approaches to teaching and learning, and to research and/or scholarship. Skill - Demonstrated capacity to implement high quality research, including collaborative research and to supervise research students. Skill - Demonstrated ability to implement new program initiatives that strive for excellence in the delivery of speech pathology services and professional practice experiences.



	• Skill - Demonstrated capacity to contribute to academic administration at the School, University, and/or professional levels in areas of teaching, research and quality improvement.
