ABOUT THE GALLERY – ABOUT OUR TEAM

The National Gallery is one of Australia's leading visual arts institutions. The National Gallery is based in Canberra and is a vital part of the Australian cultural landscape. Our Purpose is to collect, preserve, promote and share the national collection of art. The Vision of the National Gallery is to be the international reference point for art in Australia, inspiring all people to explore, experience and learn. WORKING AT THE GALLERY

When you work at the National Gallery you will be exposed to some of the world's leading Australian and international art and artists. We are located in the National triangle on the waterfront and your lunchtimes can be spent in our beautiful sculpture garden or around Lake Burley Griffin.

We support flexible working practices, including working from home, and you will have access to low-cost, onsite car parking.

OVERVIEW OF THE ROLE

The Object Conservation Technician is based in the Conservation Department at the NGA. The Department employs conservators specialising in paper, paintings, objects, textiles, time-based media, and preventive conservation. This position sits within the Object Conservation section; however, they may be called upon to assist other Conservation sections. The Objects Conservation Technician reports to the Senior Objects Conservator and is responsible for assisting the Objects team in reaching their goals for care of objects in the National Collection. This position is ongoing, full-time, 5 days per week.

The Object Conservation Technician has responsibility for the day-to-day maintenance of works of art in the sculpture garden and assists Object Conservators in more major treatments of the outdoor sculptures, such as hot and cold waxing. Additionally, they may work at our offsite storage facilities and occasionally travel to work on sculptures that are situated at offsite locations or on loan.

The Technician also works on tasks within the conservation lab producing specialist mounts and forms for object-based works of art, stitching and pinning jewellery and beaded objects to mounts and supports, undertaking maintenance of mechanical works of art, and a variety of other tasks that require a high-level of manual dexterity and attention to detail.

This role involves well developed practical skills, and an understanding of the materials that comprise objectbased works of art, particularly metals and outdoor sculptures. A high-level of physical fitness is required because many tasks involve the use of heavy machinery, climbing ladders or scaffolding, wading into the pond to clean sculptures, and working in varied weather conditions. We welcome applicants who have transferable industry experience in metal working, sculpture manufacturing, art handling and installing WOA.

The Technician must be self-sufficient and able to procure and maintain equipment and take initiative to manage small projects. Teamwork and a collaborative attitude are essential as the Technician may supervise and work with contractors and external experts. They must possess strong people skills as they will frequently work cross-departmentally with the exhibitions, loans, registration or building services teams. Effective communication skills are essential, to ensure all stakeholders are informed about the status of projects in a clear and timely manner.

An agile and adaptable attitude to workload and responsibilities is necessary as within the National Gallery we work towards a dynamic and full exhibition schedule. Flexibility to adapt to a varying workload or changing priorities is important.

OUR IDEAL CANDIDATE – SELECTION CRITERIA

- Proven experience and ability to undertake a wide range of manual tasks relevant to the maintenance, handling, and manufacture of forms/supports for the display of works of art, particularly objects.
- Knowledge of gallery practices and basic conservation principles is highly desirable.
- An understanding of materials and techniques used in the production of works of art with an emphasis on metal objects.
- A demonstrated understanding and appreciation of the visual arts.
- Well-developed organisational skills, with a proven ability to plan and carry out practical projects under limited supervision, while managing competing priorities.
- Flexibility to work within a fast paced and changing work environment.
- Experience in database entry and management of a Collection Management System (such as KeEMU) would be an advantage.
- Demonstrated ability to build good working relationships and work collaboratively with conservators, curators, technical staff, and to supervise contractors using well developed interpersonal skills.

• Good colour vision, manual dexterity, and physical health commensurate with the duties of the position. (Ability to lift, climb ladders, work at heights, use tools and equipment).

WHAT WILL YOU DO - DUTY STATEMENT

In accordance with the APS 4 work level standards, you will have the following key responsibilities:

- 1. Undertake day to day maintenance of the sculpture collection in the Sculpture Garden and work on projects to care for this collection. This includes works of art off site.
- 2. Consult with internal staff (Curatorial, Building Services for instance) and external stakeholders (such as contractors) on matters relating to the Sculpture Garden, and advise the Senior Objects Conservator on the conservation needs of these objects when required.
- 3. Assist and support the Objects Conservation team to maintain works of art in the National Gallery collection. This may include manufacturing or advising on display supports and assisting with maintenance of mechanical works of art.
- 4. Create and maintain documentation in relation to all work undertaken in the Sculpture Garden and National Collection Objects.
- 5. Supervise staff, volunteers and students as required.
- 6. Assist with the implementation of the Integrated Pest Management Plan and Quarantine procedures.
- 7. Provide broad conservation support in other sections as required to help the Department meet its goals to care for the collection during storage and display.
- 8. Observe all WH&S requirements of the section and its activities.
- 9. Undertake relevant internal and external training as required.

WHO ARE WE LOOKING FOR

To be successful in this role you will need to demonstrate the following,

You will:

- 1. Take personal responsibility for accurate completion of work and seek guidance when required. Show initiative and drive to achieve goals.
- 2. Think strategically understanding the work environment and contribute to the development of plans, strategies and team goals and identify problems that may impact on the work goals. Be active in finding solutions.
- 3. Listens to, consider different ideas, and discuss issues credibly and thoughtfully. Identify other people's expectations and concerns. Record decisions to a suitable level for conservation reporting.
- 4. Research and analyse information and draw accurate conclusions based on evidence; analyse and interpret information to inform decision makers.
- 5. Establish task plans and simple project plans with measurable milestones to deliver objectives. Respond in a positive and flexible manner to change. Share information with others and adapt to a changing environment.
- 6. Demonstrate flexibility and cope effectively with day-to-day work changes, shifting priorities and periods of uncertainty.

You should provide a tailored CV (**maximum of three pages**) along with a **statement** of no more than **two pages** that outlines your skills, capabilities and experience, against the information above.

In your statement response you should keep in mind the capabilities and behaviours required to be successful for this role, as identified in the information above. Try not to duplicate information that can be found in your CV but do highlight any specific examples or achievements that demonstrate your ability to perform the role.
